

## The bedrock of human rights communication



# Article 19, International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights

"Everyone has the right to freedom of opinion and expression: this right includes freedom to hold opinions without interference and to seek, receive and impart information and ideas through any media and regardless of frontiers"





#### Effective human rights communication means ...

> Explicitly & accurately linking development objectives to relevant human rights standards - (economic, social, cultural, civil & political rights).

Clearly identifying relevant rights-holders & duty-bearers

Beneficiaries of development cooperation/humanitarian aid are *Rights-holders:* ie all human beings (not just citizens).

States are the primary legal *duty-bearers* obliged to respect, protect & fulfil human rights (including where they delegate tasks through decentralisation, privatisation etc).

IGOs, transnational corporations & non-state armed groups are also human rights duty-bearers, bound by a range of legal & policy obligations.

> Tailoring the language according to the medium, context, audience etc





#### The rationale for communicating human rights (1) ...

> Emphasizes the universality, indivisibility, interdependence of human rights, binding Switzerland & development partner states.

Ensures legal accuracy & coherence with SDC's policy commitment <u>SDC Guidance on Human Rights in Development &</u> <u>Cooperation (2019)</u>.

Empowers & enhances participation of "beneficiaries" in their development – "from needs to rights"

Ensures visibility of gender & vulnerability issues that impeded development efforts





### The rationale for communicating human rights (2) ...

Emphasizes donor accountability (as a duty-bearer), for how we do things & what we achieve.

Emphasizes the sustainability benefits of human rights-based development.

Protects Human Rights Defenders & reinforces efforts of local human rights CSOs etc by <u>normalising</u> human rights language.
