Changing patterns of pollution and disease – evidence and needed action

In health, we are witnessing a major epidemiological shift. Infectious, parasitic and nutritional diseases are decreasing worldwide. Through improved access to safe drinking water and household sanitation, but also preventive interventions, such as vaccines, mosquito nets etc. great achievement have been made. However, an increasing burden of non-communicable diseases (NCDs) is gradually offsetting those gains. A phenomenon called "environmental risk transition" is driving this shift.

140th session of the Executive Board



WHO's Executive Board convened in Geneva from 23-31 January 2017. During the meeting, it selected by vote the following 3 candidates to be presented to the World Health Assembly as nominees for the post of Director General of the WHO: Dr. Tedros Ghebreyesus from Ethiopia, Dr. David Nabarro from the UK and Dr. Sania Nishtar from Pakistan. The new Director-General will be chosen by all Member States by vote at the World Health Assembly in May 2017 and will take office on 1 July 2017.

I am Programme Manager at IAMANEH Schweiz. IAMANEH is



Looming crisis



Mozambique - SolidarMed expects this year to be exceptionally difficult for the district health authorities to manage. In February/March 2017, the country suffered a national stock out of gloves and no certainty when the system will be able to re-establish sufficient supply in the districts. This combined with the threatening stock outs of essential drugs, such as antibiotics, projects a potentially grim future. While SolidarMed will prepare for the worst, the solution can only come from higher levels.

Elvira Muratalieva, Swiss Embassy in Kyrgyzstan, Swiss Cooperation Office

I was very happy to join the Swiss Cooperation in Kyrgyzstan in 2006,

which gave me a possibility to contribute to the development process of my country. I am a medical doctor by background, but only worked in the hospital for two years. This experience was sufficient for me to understand that earning money through informal payments that existed in the medical system did not correspond with my principles. Since 1999, I have been working with many different donor organisations acting in various areas of the health sector. I am confident that I bring more benefits to the population of my country by working with development projects. The Swiss health portfolio in Kyrgyzstan comprises a high degree of complementarity between projects at the central level, such as SWAp, and other projects implemented in parallel with a strong focus on primary care and quality improvement of health services.

SolidarMed at the Conference on Retroviruses and Opportunistic Infections (CROI)



In February, <u>SolidarMed</u> presented findings from a 2-year cohort study on HIV/HBV co-infected patients <u>in Zambia</u> and Mozambique by the <u>leDEA collaboration</u>, suggesting that these patients die prematurely, especially in rural contexts of SSA. National data on HBV and HIV co-infection are very scarce. These findings are of considerable value to national authorities in the quest to define national guidelines for HBV.

Assessing antenatal care services in Burkina Faso



In March, Enfants du Monde supported Burkina Faso's Ministry of Health (MoH) to conduct an assessment of the quality of antenatal care (ANC) services in the district of Koupela. The assessment team observed ANC visits and met with health staff in five health centres. Preliminary analysis suggests that there are important shortages in terms of human and material resources and that ANC visits often do not conform to MoH protocol. These gaps at within health services impact utilisation as they discourage women and families from seeking care.
