How Mobiles Change Smallholder Farmers' Lives



The SDC funded Agri-Fin Mobile project will soon be completed. Several tens of thousands of smallholder farmers have increased their earnings thanks to the provision of financial and agricultural services via mobile phones. The Global Programme Food Security presents promising results in a new Global Brief.

The projects encourages smallholder farmers in Indonesia, Zimbabwe and Uganda to use their mobile phones on a daily basis to access a range of financial services. The SDC and the project implementer Mercy Corps have successfully initiated various pilot models in collaboration with private-sector actors:

Indonesia: Together with local banks farmers are offered a loan per hectare of cropland coupled with farm advisory services and loss-of-earnings insurance in the event of drought or a devastating cyclone.

Zimbabwe: The EcoFarmer digital platform provides farmers with weather forecasts, practical advice, reductions on a variety of agricultural inputs and an insurance against partial harvest losses during a serious flood or drought; mobile financial services will soon be offered too.

Uganda: The Agri-Fin Mobile project has introduced a system for money transfer via mobile phone that offers smallholder farmers safer transactions and increased transparency. At the same time it supports the effort of a local IT company to equip rural cooperatives with a financial management software.

and other approaches.




How women benefit from sustainable agricultural intensification
