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## Food Systems Dialogues: Switzerland's experience



As announced in the December newsletter edition, the **Swiss Agency for Development and Cooperation (SDC)** will organise a series of **independent Food Systems Dialogues** between April and June 2021, in [English](#), [French](#) and [Spanish](#)\*\*.

With its involvement in a broad range of activities in food systems in developing and transition countries, as well as emerging economies, the SDC is in a unique position to mobilise diverse and relevant food system actors to engage in a multi-stakeholder dialogue around transdisciplinary topics. These dialogues are expected to contribute to a common understanding on the priorities in the transformation of food systems to achieve the SDG Agenda 2030. They will also contribute to the planning and implementation of the interventions of the SDC and its partners, in addition to feeding into the UN Food Systems Summit through our reports and that of the Swiss delegates to the summit.

**Switzerland, led by the Federal Office of Agriculture (FOAG)**, has already organised a number of FSDs, with more yet to come. In an interview, **Alwin Kopse from the Swiss Federal Office of Agriculture (FOAG)** told us more about their experiences in organising these events. He also shared some lessons learned along the way, discussing why these dialogues matter.


## UNEP Food Waste Index Report 2021

## CGIAR – Webinar on One Health Approach





Civil Servant of the Global Programme Food Security at SDC

What do you love about your work, what is special about it?

I studied Social Sciences and have worked in this context, more specifically in the areas of migration and integration. My work with SDC is quite a change and what I love about it is the more technical aspects of food security and nutrition. It gives me a new perspective on how the globalized world functions and how certain programs are implemented, while also considering the social aspects and context of the people affected by these changes. I also enjoy discovering more about how food systems and food security are connected with other important challenges like climate change, migration, health and water. This provides me with a good overview of the work the SDC has been doing and will do in the future. I think its transdisciplinary approach is very important and impactful in the globalized world of today.

If you could be doing anything, anywhere right now, what and where would it be?

Last year I travelled to Africa (Tanzania) for the first time and I fell in love with this country at first sight. I would love to go back and explore Ethiopia, Kenya, South Africa, Morocco, Nigeria, Senegal, and Mali. Besides travelling, I would also like to set up a development project, for example in school or sport facilities, because I have experience working as a teacher and a football coach in Switzerland. During my journey in Tanzania, I was amazed by how much impact small actions can have, sometimes with little means. I want to go back there one day and work for a project or even start my own.

What is the most important lesson you have learned from your work?

Calmness and composure: in Tanzania the life motto is “Hakuna Matata” (No problem!). This lesson could - and should - also be applied more here in Switzerland, where we tend to be perfectionists and seek over-optimisation, yet our tasks seem to overwhelm us. With an approximate 100 e-mails the average worker receives every day, we should still try to stay calm and think positive. Things don't have to be perfect, good enough is also good enough.

*Lee Zbinden is 26 years old. He comes from Thun, but is now living in Bern at Europaplatz, directly across the street from SDC. At the end of last year, he obtained his Bachelor's Degree in Social Anthropology, Social Sciences and Philosophy. Directly afterwards he went to Tanzania for 5 weeks, travelling and working in a school with a football-academy. His travel ignited his interest in Development and Cooperation. He will be working with the Global Programme Food Security at SDC's headquarters for 6 months. He is looking forward to meeting and working with his team and other A+FS networkers – not only through a computer screen.*
