The war on Ukraine has quickly evolved from being the human tragedy it is in its own right and a challenge to Europe's security structure, to becoming a truly international crisis of global proportions. Especially, food-importing countries are suffering, and people are forced to sacrifice healthy nutritional choices. At the same time, farmers are increasingly having to crop without fertilisers or opting to skip a planting season.

A very timely and readable IPES report, "[Another Perfect Storm?](#)" (presented at the last [Thoughts for Food](#) event) argues convincingly that the current crisis we face cannot be attributed solely to the war on Ukraine. Rather, the report identifies **structural factors which are fundamentally weakening the world's ability to respond more robustly to shock.**

In the A+FS Network, we are currently preparing to launch our **Food System Learning Journey (FSLJ)** in September. The current crisis will of course colour our approach to our learning journey, but also give the undertaking a new sense of direction and urgency.

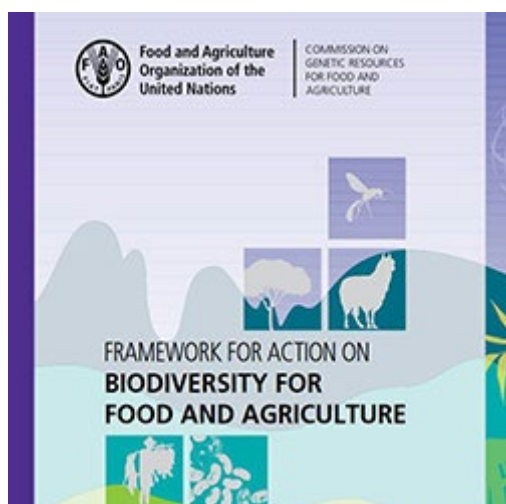
Stories from Rwandan biowaste workers

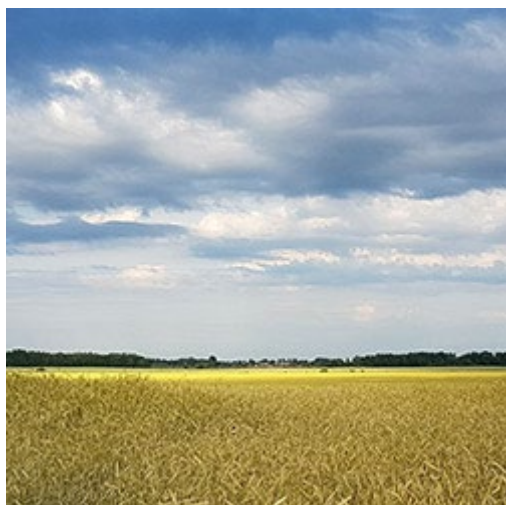


Biodiversity for Food and Agriculture

Who is your personal hero/heroine?

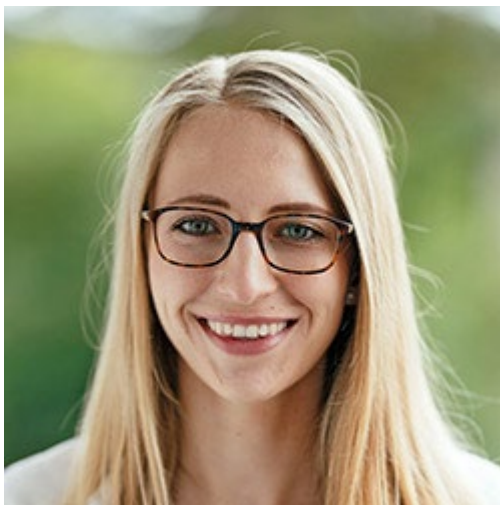
