<b>Title</b>	<b>Gender, fragility &amp; violence (part I and II)</b>
<b>Focus and Key questions</b>	<p>In tackling the violation of women’s rights to a life free of violence, SDC has a number of projects addressing sexual &amp; gender based violence (SGBV). We hear a lot about the flag-ship programme in the Great Lakes which takes a psychosocial approach, but there are many more projects in Latin America, Central Europe and the Middle East. Through a “capitalization process” we have gathered the extensive experience within SDC on addressing SGBV in many different contexts – encompassing aspects of health, psychological support and counselling, rule of law and justice, and including work with perpetrators and wider family members as well as the victims/survivors.</p> <p>Together with you, we will discuss how we can make best use of our knowledge on addressing SGBV in the future.
