Looking back at the F2F Meeting in Sarajevo

Around 75 members of the **dlgn** participated in our second F2F event, which was organized in Sarajevo, from March 7-11. Three days of intensive discussions of SDC thematic issues were followed by two days of conferences and workshops at the Municipal Fair – NEXPO - organized by NALAS, at the occasion of its general assembly.

The F2F was the culmination of intensive learning and exchange activities that took place during the months preceding the meeting, involving around 60 **dlgn** members in the preparation, analysis and synthesis of case studies. In fact, there were so many interesting good practice documents produced that parallel sessions had to be organized, to discuss them in depth. The only disadvantage was, of course, that some participants missed the discussion on certain issues, since they could not participate in two parallel sessions at the same time. In spite of this small disadvantage, in general, participants found the discussions enriching, stimulating, and relevant to orient our practice towards improved impact and quality. However, in order to make the discussions from the different sessions available to everyone, a dlgn blog was developed, where the F2F programme, presentations, discussions, impressions, photos and opinions of participants are to be found. It was certainly an eye-opener to realize that from all the work done on the chosen topics, **good practices** became evident and clear recommendations emerged, which can be institutionalized and integrated in a policy paper on **Decentralisation and Local Governance**.

NALAS NEXPO a successful networking event

For this event, organized in Bosnia & Herzgowina in the Balkan region, SDC partnered with the Network of Associations of Local Authorities of South-East Europe - NALAS. Around 1200 delegates from 15 south-eastern European countries participated in the municipal fair. This offered a unique opportunity to exchange with mayors and staff, who are partners of SDC programs in the Western Balkans. After the F2F – dlgn's next steps

After this successful event, what will be the next steps? The core group in Berne had first discussions on the planning of activities for the next 6-10 months. We shall organize a workshop to detail our plans on May 4, where we shall treat the follow-up of the learning projects and what remains to do in order to consolidate our good practices (documents, orienting guidelines, etc.) and how to pursue and intensify learning and exchange on the basis of these orientations. In a second step, we shall reflect on the policy recommendations we can derive from these learning processes, which can nourish a future policy for decentralisation and local governance. And finally, we shall discuss topics, which we need to deepen in the future, in order to respond to practical needs and policy demands. We shall keep you informed and **invite you to comment and complement our planning**. Very useful would also be if you can respond by informing about **PCM-moments forts** in your programme for which you would like colleagues from the network to participate and to contribute.

Decentralisation and fragility

Is there a nexus between state fragility and decentralisation? There have always been debates whether decentralisation is a strategy against fragility - strengthening the state bottom-up - or an instrument that promotes centrifugal tendencies. At a roundtable in Switzerland on April 6, Dinesh Tripathi, a Supreme Court Lawyer from Nepal presented the challenge.

Mr. Tripathi identified the lack of (implementation of) decentralisation as a strong factor for the current fragility of the state in Nepal. While previously, the centre managed to uphold at least a minimum level of service delivery, current stalemates at the centre and the almost complete lack of decentralised institutions led to a breakdown of public service-delivery in wide parts of the country. This also created challenges for the sustainability of the development work. In his view, effective decentralisation would have helped to keep the state functioning during times of political crisis at the centre.

At the same time, current debates on federalism in Nepal created apprehension of some groups, to the extent that it would encourage them to seek for more than own decision-making powers within Nepal. In general, it can be noted, that debates on decentralisation (or federalism) can bring division and power struggles to the forefront.

Furthermore, experiences in other countries show that it very much depends on the design of the decentralization process or non-centralised governance, whether it contributes to stability and creates space for development. Some experiences even demonstrate that decentralisation can be used to strengthen top-down accountability and to enlarge the reach of power-holders at the centre, or enlarge the space for corruption and repression.

This debate on fragility and decentralisation is particularly relevant in view of current developments in Northern Africa. Under what circumstances can decentralisation help to build stronger and more legitimate states and improve governance? How to approach a decentralisation debate, so that it does not unnecessarily fuel rivalries between groups? And finally, how should decentralisation is to be designed, so that it can bring benefits for stability and democratic development?

Effective support for decentralisation and local governance takes into account the three dimensions: the assessment of the context, the reform process and its actors, as well as, the institutional design of decentralisation. If done in a conflict sensitive way, decentralisation can lead to balance power and strengthen governance at all levels, bring state institutions closer to civil society - and contribute to overcoming fragility.

Summer Course on Decentralization and Local Governance

From the 11 – 15 July 2011, The Hague Academy for local governance is offering a summer course on Decentralization and Local Governance.
