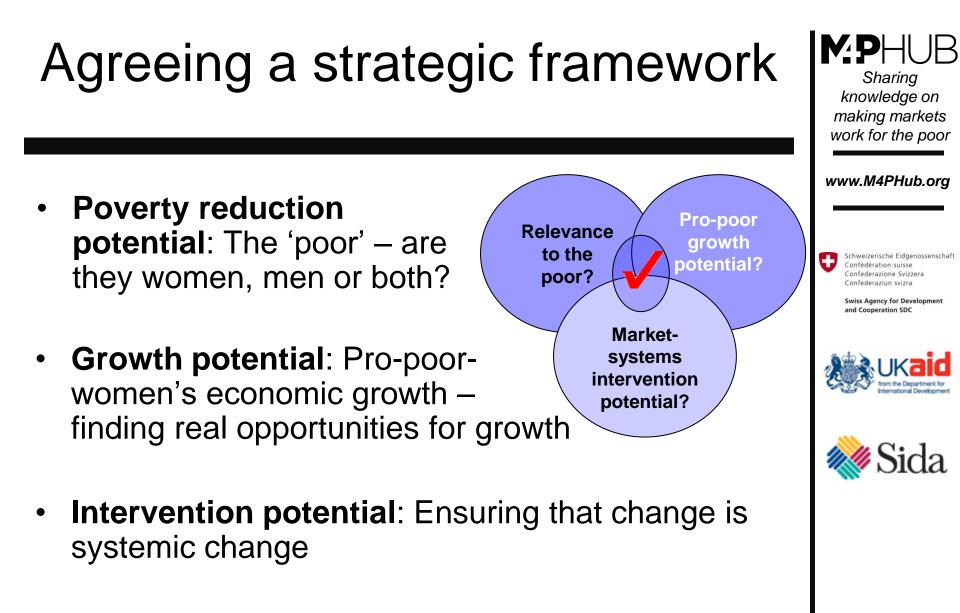


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Understanding where women are in the system

- Apply the market lens: Understand the market as a 'system' and its dynamics first
- **Apply the gender lens**: Once better understood, disaggregating a market-system is more meaningful:
 - What are the different functions women and men play?
 - Do poor women and men face the same or different disadvantages in the system?
- From symptoms to causes of gender-specific market-systems failure:
 - What are the underlying reasons why the market-system is failing the poor?
 - Why is it that the market-system is failing poor women more or differently than men?

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Planning interventions & outcomes

- Sustainability: Defining real and lasting outcomes for women and men
 - Who will do, who will pay?
- Feasibility: Outcomes that can be realised by the proposed intervention
 - What can and cannot be achieved with the resources to hand?
- Logic: Establishing a robust Theory of Change
 - Demonstrate, with rigour, the links between interventions and the results and outcomes envisaged / promised



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Implementation challenges

Facilitation doesn't get any easier:

- Finding Change Agents for WEE
- Aligning incentives and skills amongst partners
- WEE skills & intervention teams integration not delegation
- **Tactics** when does 'disruptive intervention' become distortive?
- **Scaling-up** outreach and crowding-in
