## What do you like about your work, what makes it special?

I like to work for a better future, and I identify with SDC's values. Our work is exciting and very varied. We have the chance to move around regularly, to travel, to live in different countries, even if the contexts can sometimes be very difficult and we ask a lot in terms of adaptation and flexibility from our partner and our children! I am passionate about meeting people from different cultures and backgrounds. We are confronted with current issues and seek viable answers to the great challenges of our century at local, national and regional level. I like to

In order to achieve sustainable results, I have also learned the importance of involving actors on the ground, of understanding local power dynamics, the essential role of policy dialogue and the great advantage of systemic approaches.
