F2FGender 2019: Thematic workshops on **Women's Political Participation**

Does women's political participation automatically lead to gender equality? No. Gender equality is not only a question of women's representation/participation in terms of numbers. It is about women's voice, leadership and influence, and gender-responsive policies.

Our hypothesis is: More women implicated in politics and leadership positions will also lead to more gender-responsive policies that promote gender equality. But important to note that men can also make gender-responsive policies. The key questions of our two workshops can be articulated as follows: **How to strengthen the influence** and impact of women's political participation?

To discuss this topic there are two thematic workshops on women's political participation being organized at the first day of the F2F (Monday 29 April):

- 1) One on women's representation and influence in local governance structures called "From women's political representation to women's political empowerment" (morning). This workshop will address the following question: How can we strengthen women's participation, influence and impact in local politics and governance?
- 2) The second workshop will focus on gender responsive and socially inclusive budgeting (afternoon): "Gender-mainstreaming in Public Finance Management to promote genderresponsive policies". It will be dedicated to the following question: How can we ensure that public policies and expenditures trigger positive change towards more gender equality and social inclusion?

1 From women's political representation to women's political empowerment

This workshop will be dedicated to the following question:

How to increase women's political representation/ participation and ensure that political participation of women is translated into influence and impact?

- What are the relevant issues and key factors? (what's the analysis?)
- What are the main obstacles identified?
- What are the strategic actions needed?

We will look at two phases in the women's political participation process:

- Election and campaign: how to get elected?
- How to be/stay in office and perform? How to make impact? How to develop leadership and be accepted/recognized as leader?

Based on these questions, NPOs will share their experiences/lessons learnt and this will be followed by an open discussion. The presentations will take place as follows: a first speaker will present his case by answering the guiding questions above (7). A second speaker, called "discussant", will respond to the presentation and compare it with his/her own experience (5).

This exercise will be done in two stages with the following speakers:

2 Gender-mainstreaming in public finance management to promote gender-responsive policies

3 Link to the field visits

These two workshops are closely linked to the field visits (option "political participation") that will take place on the second day of the F2F and will allow us to discover the Swiss realities and experiences on women's political participation with various actors in this field. A first part of the visit will take us to the municipality of Köniz to discuss with representatives of the municipal, cantonal and federal levels the implementation of the gender equality law, the challenges and priorities, the resources available and the application (or not) of gender responsive budgeting at the three levels of the Swiss political system. The second visit will take us to Alliance F to exchange with Swiss female politicians from different parties on their situation (what does it mean to be a woman involved in politics in Switzerland?), the challenges they face, the factors facilitating their activity, etc. They will present their campaign "Helvetia calls", which aims to increase the number of female parliamentarians in the federal (and cantonal) elections of 2019 and thus mobilizes, supports and accompanies the female candidates.
