

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1. Mandate

- Universal mandate guided by the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child.
- To save children's lives, to defend their rights, and to help them fulfil their potential, from early childhood through adolescence.
- Humanitarian and development contexts
- 5 goal areas in the Strategic Plan 2022-2025





2. Country presence – working modalities in countries

- Presence in over 190 programme countries and territories
- 33 National Committees in high-income countries – fundraising and advocacy
- Partners in-country include governments, private sector, research institutes, NGOs, community based organisations and social movements (implementing partners)
- Multi-year strategic Country Programme Document aligned to the UN Sustainable Development Cooperation Framework.
- Project acquisition and/or fundraising at country level – many country offices do not receive funds from HQ



3. Swiss focus in governing bodies and funding

- Strengthened education for children and improved protection of children from violence and exploitation
- Humanitarian-development Nexus
- Improved institutional effectiveness, in particular independent evaluation, partnerships with private sector, financial sustainability and gender transformative programming.
- System-wide partnerships and implementation of the UNDS reform

UNICEF's total income 2021

USD 8.2 billion

Swiss contribution 2021

USD 54.2 million

- Core contribution: CHF 19.3 million
- Additional funding: CHF 34.9 million



4. Organizational performance

Prosperity**


By increasing the incomes of the poorest 40 percent of people in every country

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- Working in 170+ countries, providing financing and technical assistance
- Working with and through government (where possible)
 - Access and engagement with authorities
 - Non-political mandate
- Financing:
 - loans, grants, guarantees
 - project financing, budget support, results-based financing
- Country Engagement process



3. Swiss focus in governing bodies and funding




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CCM Thematic Priorities

- Climate Change, Fragility and Conflict, Jobs & Economic Transformation, Gender, Governance
- Human Capital
 - Strengthening **public health systems** that provide **quality** services and are universally **accessible**
 - Holistic **COVID-19 health response** (HSS, vaccines, diagnostics and therapeutics)
 - **Partnerships** with relevant UN agencies, global funds and MDBs

Swiss Contributions


- **IDA20:** 23.5bn of donor contributions for 93bn envelope 2022-2025
- **CH Contribution:** \$ 725m (N° 10 donor)
- **Multi-bi:** active projects of CHF 141m in 2022 (Health: KYR, MOL, UKR, BIH)

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

5. Health

- **Covid-19 Response: 12.9bn in 2020-21**
 - Vaccines purchasing and deployment (7.5bn in 67 countries), diagnostics, therapeutics
 - Health system strengthening
 - Coordination with partners
- IDA20: New Special Theme **Human Capital** (health, education, social protection)
- **One Health** Approach
- Pandemic prevention, preparedness and response



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1. Mandate



UNFPA's stated **mission** is to deliver a world where every pregnancy is wanted, every childbirth is safe and every young person's potential is fulfilled.

The **three outcomes** are to accelerate by 2025 the reduction

- i) in the unmet need for family planning,
- ii) of preventable maternal deaths and
- iii) in gender-based violence and harmful practices.

Its main **areas of work** include:

- sexual and reproductive health and rights SRHR,
- gender equality and women's/youth empowerment
- data for development



2. Country presence – working modalities in countries

Present in more than 150 countries. Engagement depends on (political) context...

- **Policy and accountability** (improved integration of SRHR and GBV-response into health policies, laws etc.)
- **Quality of care and services** (SRH and GBV-response)
- **Gender and social norms** (mechanisms and capacities of actors and institutions to address discriminatory norms)
- **Adolescents and youth** (strengthened skills and opportunities)
- **Population data** to enhance development policies (i.a. census)
- **Humanitarian action**



3. Swiss focus in governing bodies and funding

Priorities in 2022-2025 for Swiss Core-Contribution (16 Mio CHF per year)

- Implementation of new Strategic Plan 2022-2025 with a focus on
 - Thematic focus on core mandate SRHR (incl. CSE) + GBV prevention/response
 - Institutional capacities in humanitarian action
 - Organizational effectiveness
 - Collaboration with UN-sister agencies (integration of UNDS Reform and a system-wide approach)



4. Organizational performance / System-wide cooperation

Organisational effectiveness

- Financial sustainability (regular resources, contributor base, innovative partnerships)
- Evaluation function (coverage, quality and use of centralized and decentralized evaluations; adequate funding of the eval function)
- Gender equality (inc. gender programming)

UNDS reform / System-wide cooperation

- System-wide and joint evaluations
- Joint, co-financed programming with other agencies
- Cooperation with the World Bank
- Contributions to the Resident Coordinator system
